Book Ideas




The Scarecrow

by Beth Ferry, Terry Fan, and Eric Fan

Themes: Concept Book | Seasons | Friendship

- Become familiar with <u>Terry Fan</u> and <u>Eric Fan</u> sharing that they are brothers who create illustrations of books together.
- Listen to the <u>Meet-the-Author Recording</u> to discover how a single word sparked an idea for this story.
- Share the <u>book trailer</u> with your readers and pause when the scarecrow is alone in the winter. Ask students: "How do you think he feels?" "What do you think will happen?" Then, play the rest of the video and encourage students to talk about their predictions.
- Read the book then extend the lesson with the drawing and counting activities found in this guide.

- Connect to the author by listening to her Audio Name Pronunciation.

Author Study Ideas

- Introduce Nikki Grimes by listening to her Audio Name Pronunciation.
- Watch the complete book reading for *Bedtime for Sweet Creatures* and listen as the illustrator describes the colors she chose in this Meet-the-Illustrator Recording.
- Choose another title by this author, such as <u>A Walk in the Woods</u> to introduce or reinforce the importance of primary resources.
- Use the share tool to create a shelf card for the <u>author</u>, adding to book baskets, displays, or shelves to help young readers understand that books have authors and illustrators.
